Water Conservation Ordinance Reminder

In an effort to protect the structural integrity of the City's water distribution system without significant and unnecessary added costs, and to promote responsible outdoor watering, the Common Council of the City of Weyauwega approved an ordinance to preserve, conserve and limit water use for lawns, grass, outside plants, trees, shrubs and similar plants.

This ordinance was approved by the City Council in 2013 and closely resembles water conservation ordinances adopted by the City of Waupaca, and other municipalities.

There shall be absolutely NO watering by unattended sprinkler systems between 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Even-numbered addresses shall only be allowed to water before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. on even-numbered days. Odd-numbered addresses

shall only be allowed to water before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. on odd-numbered days.

Use of handheld sprayers/hoses for watering is allowed at any time on any day. Newly seeded and newly sod lawns may be watered by sprinkler every day with a permit issued by the city but only before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.

Violations of this ordinance will be penalized. First offense will be issued a written warning. Second offense will be fined \$10 - \$25. Third and subsequent offenses will be fined \$25 - \$100.

Dog & Cat Licensing

2016 Dog and Cat Licenses are available at City Hall, 109 E. Main Street. Animal licenses expire each year on December 31st and must be renewed by April 1st to avoid a late fee.

- Spayed Female and Neutered Male \$3.00
- Unspayed Female and Unneutered Male \$8.00

Deadline: A late fee of \$5.00 will be charged if the owner of a dog 5 (five) months of age or over fails to obtain a license prior to April 1st of each year or within 30 days of acquiring ownership of a licensable animal.

Proof of rabies vaccine is required before a license will be issued.

Grass Clippings

All grass clippings from lawn mowing or other sources shall not be allowed to blow upon or accumulate in significant quantities upon any public street in the City of Weyauwega where such grass clippings could wash into any storm sewer drainage inlet.

Please do not mow grass into the roadway in front of your residence, per City of Weyauwega Code of Ordinances 419-23.

- Needles/Lancets/Syringes

NEW GUIDELINES: Empty pills into a plastic sealable bag. Keep liquids, creams, powders in original containers. Place liquid medication bottles in a plastic bag. Recycle empty pill bottles and paper boxes at home.

Regulation of Length of Lawn, Grasses and Weeds

The Common Council finds that lawns, grasses, and noxious weeds on non-agricultural lots or parcels of land, as classified under the City Zoning Code, within the City of Weyauwega **which exceed eight (8) inches in length** adversely affect the public health and safety of the public in that they tend to emit pollen and other discomforting bits of plants, constitute a fire hazard, and a safety hazard in that debris can be hidden in the grass, interferes with the public convenience, and adversely affects property values of other land within the City.

For that reason, any non-agricultural lawn, grass, or weed on a lot or other parcel of land **which exceeds eight (8) inches in length** is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

The City of Weyauwega may issue written notice to require the cutting of grasses/weeds exceeding eight (8) inches in length. In the event that the issue is not resolved within the timeline identified in writing, the City reserves the right to authorize/contract for the grasses or weeds to be cut, with applicable costs and expenses to be billed to the property owner.

How To Protect Yourself from the Costs to Remedy Sewer Back-Ups in Your Home

The City has determined that there may be certain areas within the City of Weyauwega that are prone or more susceptible to sanitary sewer backups. In some cases there may be problems with the City's infrastructure, and in other cases, there are things that cannot be prevented from the City's perspective.

When such a sewer backup does occur that is not of the negligence of the City of Weyauwega, the City's insurance carrier does not cover the cost associated with restoration, rehabilitation and clean-up of such incidents, accidents or occurrences. The costs to clean and restore your property after a sewer backup situation are usually placed on the homeowner, when the City is determined not to be negligent by law. With that, it behooves City residents to have one, or both, of the following protections in place:

1. Acquisition and possession of homeowners insurance that includes coverage for sanitary sewer backup situations.
2. A backflow preventer, which prevents sanitary sewer material from back-flowing out of the main lines and into your home.

These are two ways in which citizens may be able to limit their liability and provide funds for cleanup and restoration,

should such a situation develop. The City hereby urges you to check into both of these options as it relates to providing assurances that you have protected your home and property.

The City of Weyauwega strives to minimize these situations from occurring and conducts routine regular maintenance of our lines and sanitary sewer infrastructure. However, there are times when excessively heavy precipitation or infrastructure obstructions occur that cause such backups.

We hope that you find this information useful and that it provides you with the information necessary to make the right decisions for your property and possessions.

When a potential sewer backup situation is occurring at your home, it is absolutely important that your first call is to the City of Weyauwega Public Works Department, and not a private plumber or contractor. The City may be able to remedy the situation independently, where a private contractor may charge you for their services.

Reminders to Property Owners with Pets – Please Respect your Neighbors

Chapter 190-6 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Weyauwega states:

1. No person having in his/her possession or ownership any dog or other domestic animal shall allow the animal to run at large within the City. The owner of animal, whether licensed or unlicensed, shall keep his/her animal tied or enclosed in a proper enclosure so as not to allow said animal to interfere with the passing public or neighbors. Any animal running at large unlicensed and required by state law or City ordinance to be licensed shall be seized and impounded by a humane or law enforcement officer or animal warden.

Chapter 190-10 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Weyauwega states:

1. **Removal of Fecal Matter.** The owner or person in charge of any dog, cat, horse, or other animal shall not

permit solid fecal matter of such animal to deposit on any street, alley or other public or private property, unless such matter is immediately removed therefrom by said owner or person in charge. This Section shall not apply to a person who is visually or physically handicapped.

2. **Accumulation of Fecal Matter Prohibited on Private Yards.** The owner or person in charge of the dog or cat must also prevent accumulation of animal waste on his/her own property by regularly patrolling and properly disposing of the fecal matter.

Health Information

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the

ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Additional Health Information

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Weyauwega Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. OUTSIDE STORAGE ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

No disassembled, inoperable, unlicensed, junked or wrecked motor vehicles, truck bodies, tractors, trailers, farm machinery, appliances or construction debris shall be stored unenclosed upon private residential property within the City of Weyauwega for a period exceeding 30 days unless it is in connection with an authorized business enterprise maintained in such a manner as to not constitute public nuisance and in compliance with City zoning regulations.

HOUSE NUMBERS

The City of Weyauwega wants to remind all residents that to ensure public safety and well being it is essential to have house numbers visible for Police, EMS, Fire and all safety personnel. The City of Weyauwega code §419-16 requires the following: The numbers shall be conspicuously placed immediately above, on or at the side of the proper door of each building so that they can be plainly seen from the street. Whenever any building is more than 50 feet from the street line, the number of the building shall be conspicuously displayed at the street line, near the walk, driveway or common entrance to such building, and upon a gatepost, fence, tree, post or other appropriate place so as to be easily discernible from the sidewalk. The numbers shall be not less than 2½ inches in height, with dark lettering against a light background. Script numbers may not be used as the primary address numbers.

HOME POOL SAFETY

As the summer approaches, the City of Weyauwega would like to take the opportunity to remind residents that if you choose to put up any type of pool the liability lies with the property owner. It is important to cover the pool, remove ladders, and protect the area to prevent accidents. Certain pools do require a permit; therefore, please contact City Hall at (920) 867-2630 before installing or erecting any pools.

STREET LIGHTS

If you notice a street light out in the City please contact City Hall at 867-2630 and notify us of the location of the light pole. If it is possible to get the pole number off of the pole that would be greatly appreciated as well. The City will then contact We Energies and relay the information to them for the repair.

2016 REGISTRATION FOR SWIMMING LESSONS

The pool will open for the 2016 season on Wednesday, June 8, 2016. The hours will be: 12:30 - 8:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday and 11:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday

Session I	Monday-Friday, June 20th to July 8th, 2016
Session II	Monday-Friday, July 11th to July 29th, 2016
Session III	Monday-Friday, August 1st to August 19th, 2016

REGISTRATION FOR SESSION I OF SWIMMING LESSONS is recommended on Wednesday, June 8th and Thursday, June 9th from 1:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. at the Weyauwega Pool for both city and non-city residents.

REGISTRATION FOR SESSION II OF SWIMMING LESSONS is recommended on Monday, June 27th and Tuesday, June 28th from 1:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. at the Weyauwega Pool for both city and non-city residents.

REGISTRATION FOR SESSION III OF SWIMMING LESSONS is recommended on Monday, July 18th and Tuesday, July 19th from 1:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. at the Weyauwega Pool for both city and non-city residents.

The cost is \$15 per person for city residents and \$25 for non-city residents who have purchased a season pass, or \$25 for city residents and \$40 for non-city residents without a season pass.

The Observation Policy will be in effect for all sessions of swimming lessons. This policy allows parents to be inside the facility to observe their child's first and last days of lessons only. This ensures that the children get the most out of their time with the instructors because both the student and the teacher are better able to focus without distractions. This policy is in effect at all YMCAs and has been very helpful in past years at our facility.

MORNING LESSONS are Monday thru Friday for a half hour starting at either 11:00 am or 11:30 a.m. for Level 1 thru 5.

EVENING LESSONS are either Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday for an hour starting at 5:00 p.m. for Level 1 thru 5.

- Level One- Introduction to Water Skills
- Level Two – Fundamental Aquatic Skills
- Level Three – Stroke Development
- Level Four – Stroke Improvement
- Level Five – Stroke Refinement

Please Note: Each level has a maximum of 10 students per lesson time so please try to have a second choice in mind when registering in case the time you want is full. Additional classes may be opened if the need arises.

SEASON PASSES AND DAY PASSES

Season passes will be available at the pool during open swim hours.

Children.....	\$2 city resident, \$3 non-city resident

*Family pass plus one includes immediate family and one other person such as a babysitter, grandparent, etc.

One non-swimming adult/parent may enter the pool area for free to supervise a paid child. All other non-swimmers must buy a swim pass to enter the pool area. It is recommended that all children under 12 be supervised by an adult.

POOL RULES – FOR YOUR SAFETY

- 1) No smoking, alcohol, or pets allowed.
- 2) Floating balls and noodles are allowed in the shallow end of the pool only.
- 3) All other flotation devices are not allowed.
- 4) No running, shoving, dunking, chicken fights, foul language, etc.
- 5) Do not throw hard objects, dig holes, or climb on the lifeguard chairs.
- 6) Do not sit or hang on the ropes.
- 7) Do not move or play with the aerators.
- 8) Patrons who wish to enter the deep water (past the 4 ft. rope) may be required to demonstrate their swimming ability.
- 9) Only one person is allowed on the diving board at a time.
- 10) No swimming under the dock or jumping off the dock (the dock is for swimming lesson use only).
- 11) Only one bounce is allowed on the diving board.
- 12) Dive or jump only in a straight line from the end of the diving board to avoid hitting swimmers.
- 13) No "bombing" people off the board (those who do not follow this rule will be kicked out immediately).

Other rules may need to be enforced at the discretion of the lifeguards. There are good reasons for all of these rules. We will be happy to answer any questions concerning the rules listed above.

The day after the “human swimming season” wraps up, the Weyauwega Swim Lake will be open for family-friendly dogs to take a “dip” in the lake.

Doggie Dip Rules:

1. Only family friendly dogs are allowed to enter the swim lake.
2. **Owners must provide documentation of their dog’s current rabies vaccination certificate** (with expiration date) the day of the swim or they will NOT be allowed inside the swim lake area.
3. Puppies must be at least 16 weeks old and be vaccinated for rabies.
4. Owners are responsible for their dogs at ALL times, including cleaning up after their dogs.
5. Fee is \$5.00 per dog.

CITY OF WEYAUWEGA GARBAGE AND RECYCLING GUIDELINES

All recyclable items, which include aluminum, glass, plastic, scrap metal, tin and steel cans, paper products, newspapers, magazines, junk mail, container board (cereal or other boxboard), and corrugated cardboard can be put in the same container. NO SORTING IS REQUIRED!

- Rinse cans/bottles and discard lids.
- No oil bottles, dishes or ceramics, window, windows, mirrors, light bulbs, food containers, Styrofoam, or hard plastic.
- Cardboard should be cut to 3 ft x 3 ft (no pizza boxes or wax-lined boxes).
- Do not put recyclables in plastic bags – use bins or garbage cans.

Recyclables should be set out at the curb before 6:00 a.m. on pickup day.

All residential garbage will be collected weekly on Tuesday, with recycling pickup scheduled for every other Tuesday. All material needs to be placed at the curb by 6:00 am to ensure pickup. Material that is not at the curb by 6:00 am may not be picked up that day. Residents are allowed to place garbage/recycling material at the curb up to 12 hours before this deadline.

Garbage must be secured in bags.

Garbage bags can be set on the curb or in a container not to exceed 50 pounds in weight.

Recyclable material must be placed in a box or other similar container at the curb a distance from the garbage.

Large household furniture and appliances will be picked up for an additional fee every other Wednesday of each month. Residents will need to contact Harter's Fox Valley Disposal (715-253-2619) to arrange for pickup and pre-pay for the service of large items. (Fees: \$25 for most items, \$50 for Freon items)

Place shredded paper in paper bag, secure and label

METAL AND GLASS:

ACCEPT

Aluminum Bottles & Cans
Steel, Tin & Bi-metal Cans
Empty Aerosol Cans
Food & Beverage Glass Bottles and Jars

DO NOT ACCEPT

No Aluminum Pans or Foil
No Empty Paint Cans

GUIDELINES:

Empty and rinse all bottles and containers
Remove and discard all screw caps
