As a victim of crime you have the right to access certain records maintained by this department regarding the crime you reported. The records you have access to will be limited to information concerning any injury, loss, or damage you may have suffered; if the offender(s) have been arrested, or referred for prosecution; as well as is if the offender(s) is being held in a secure facility and if or when they will be released. Finally, information may be released to you for the purpose of recovering damages you suffered as a result of the offender's act.

1. Please contact the police department if you are subject to threats or intimidation arising from your cooperation with law enforcement or prosecution efforts relating to the investigation of any crime. **Call 911 if you are in immediate danger.**
2. You have the right have any stolen, recovered, or seized property, which is no longer needed as evidence returned to you as soon as possible. Contact the officer listed above to determine when property may be released.
3. You have the right to have restitution ordered by the court. For purposes of restitution, it is important you gather and keep accurate documentation about your losses and provide that information to the investigating officer. The District Attorney or Juvenile Intake may also request this information.

You may contact the officer listed above at anytime to add information to the complaint, ask questions, or determine the status of the investigation.

“THE INVISIBLE WOUND”

We the Officers of the Weyauwega Police Department realize that being a victim of crime can be a very disturbing experience. Forget what you have seen on TV or in the movies. Crime and its effects are seldom tied up in an hour or so. Crime disrupts the health, personal outlook, and relationships of its victims.

Crime often destroys a victim's sense of trust in their surroundings and their sense of control over their lives. This intangible impact has often been described as an invisible wound on the life of the victim of a crime.

Just as a physical wound takes time to heal, the invisible wound inflicted by crime takes time to heal. The healing process depends on each victim. It can take weeks or months for victims of crime to regain their emotional balance. Time and understanding are the best remedies for dealing with the impact of a crime.

Talking is often the best medicine to heal the invisible wound. Family and friends need to listen to the victim no matter how many times the victim speaks of the crime that was committed against them. Victims need non-judgmental support and time to heal at their own pace.
