New Water Conservation Ordinance

In an effort to protect the structural integrity of the City's water distribution system without significant and unnecessary added costs, and to promote responsible outdoor watering, the Common Council of the City of Weyauwega recently approved an ordinance to preserve, conserve and limit water use for lawns, grass, outside plants, trees, shrubs and similar plants.

This ordinance was approved at the City Council meeting on Monday 5/20/13, and closely resembles water conservation ordinances adopted by the City of Waupaca, and other municipalities.

There shall be absolutely NO watering by unattended sprinkler systems between 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Even-numbered addresses shall only be allowed to water before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. on even-numbered days. Odd-numbered addresses shall only be allowed to water before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m. on odd-numbered days.

Use of handheld sprayers/hoses for watering is allowed at any time on any day. Newly seeded and newly sod lawns may be watered by sprinkler every day with a permit issued by the city but only before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.

Violations of this ordinance will be penalized. First offense will be issued a written warning. Second offense will be fined \$10-\$25. Third and subsequent offenses will be fined \$25-\$100.

Dog & Cat Licensing

2013 Dog and Cat Licenses are available at City Hall, 109 E. Main Street. Animal licenses must be renewed yearly.

Spayed Female and Neutered Male \$3.00
Unspayed Female and Unneutered Male \$8.00

Deadline: A late fee of \$5.00 will be charged if the owner of a dog 5 (five) months of age or over fails to obtain a license prior to April 1st of each year or within 30 days of acquiring ownership of a licensable animal.

Proof of rabies vaccine is required before a license will be issued.

How To Protect Yourself from the Costs to Remedy Sewer Back-Ups in Your Home

The City has determined that there may be certain areas within the City of Weyauwega that are prone or more susceptible to sanitary sewer backups. In some cases there may be problems with the City's infrastructure, and in other cases, there are things that cannot be prevented from the City's perspective.

When such a sewer backup does occur that is *not* of the negligence of the City of Weyauwega, the City's insurance carrier does not cover the cost associated with restoration, rehabilitation and clean-up of such incidents, accidents or occurrences. The costs to clean and restore your property after a sewer backup situation are usually placed on the homeowner, when the City is determined not to be negligible by law. With that, it behooves City residents to have one, or both, of the following protections in place:

1. Acquisition and possession of homeowners insurance that includes coverage for sanitary sewer backup situations.
2. A backflow preventer, which prevents sanitary sewer material from back-flowing out of the main lines and into your home.

These are two ways in which citizens may be able to limit their liability and provide funds for cleanup and restoration, should such a situation develop. The City hereby urges you to check into both of these options as it relates to providing assurances that you have protected your home and property.

The City of Weyauwega strives to minimize these situations from occurring and conducts routine regular maintenance of our lines and sanitary sewer infrastructure. However, there are times when excessively heavy precipitation or infrastructure obstructions occur that cause such backups.


When a potential sewer backup situation is occurring at your home, it is absolutely important that your first call is to the City of Weyauwega Public Works Department, and not a private plumber or contractor. The City may be able to remedy the situation independently, where a private contractor may charge you for their services.

Grass Clippings

All grass clippings from lawn mowing or other sources shall not be allowed to blow upon or accumulate in significant quantities upon any public street in the City of Weyauwega where such grass clippings could wash into any storm sewer drainage inlet.

Please do not mow grass into the roadway in front of your residence, per City of Weyauwega Code of Ordinances 419-23.



Reminders to Property Owners with Pets: Please Respect Your Neighbors

Chapter 190-6 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Weyauwega states:

1. No person having in his/her possession or ownership any dog or other domestic animal shall allow the animal to run at large within the City. The owner of animal, whether licensed or unlicensed, shall keep his/her animal tied or enclosed in a proper enclosure so as not to allow said animal to interfere with the passing public or neighbors. Any animal running at large unlicensed and required by state law or City ordinance to be licensed shall be seized and impounded by a humane or law enforcement officer or animal warden.



Chapter 190-10 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Weyauwega states:

1. **REMOVAL OF FECAL MATTER.** The owner or person in charge of any dog, cat, horse, or other animal shall not permit solid fecal matter of such animal to deposit on any street, alley or other public or private property, unless such matter is immediately removed therefrom by said owner or person in charge. This Section shall not apply to a person who is visually or physically handicapped.
2. **ACCUMULATION OF FECAL MATTER PROHIBITED ON PRIVATE YARDS.** The owner or person in charge of the dog or cat must also prevent accumulation of animal waste on his/her own property by regularly patrolling and properly disposing of the fecal matter.

Outside Storage on Private Property

No disassembled, inoperable, unlicensed, junked or wrecked motor vehicles, truck bodies, tractors, trailers, farm machinery, appliances or construction debris shall be stored unenclosed upon private residential property within the City of Weyauwega for a period exceeding 30 days unless it is in connection with an authorized business enterprise maintained in such a manner as to not constitute public nuisance and in compliance with City zoning regulations.

Outside Storage on Private Property (Municipal Code Sec. 378-1)

Regulation of Length of Lawn, Grasses and Weeds

The Common Council finds that lawns, grasses, and noxious weeds on non-agricultural lots or parcels of land, as classified under the City Zoning Code, within the City of Weyauwega **which exceed eight (8) inches in length** adversely affect the public health and safety of the public in that they tend to emit pollen and other discomforting bits of plants, constitute a fire hazard, and a safety hazard in that debris can be hidden in the grass, interferes with the public convenience, and adversely affects property values of other land within the City.

For that reason, any non-agricultural lawn, grass, or weed on a lot or other parcel of land **which exceeds eight (8) inches in length** is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

The City of Weyauwega may issue written notice to require the cutting of grasses/weeds exceeding eight (8) inches in length. In the event that the issue is not resolved within the timeline identified in writing, the City reserves the right to authorize/contract for the grasses or weeds to be cut, with applicable costs and expenses to be billed to the property owner.

Regulation of Length of Lawn and Grasses (Municipal Code Sec. 283-6)

As the summer approaches, the City of Weyauwega would like to take the opportunity to remind residents that if you choose to put up any type of pool, the liability



lies with the property owner. It is important to cover the pool, remove ladders, and protect the area to prevent accidents. Certain pools do require a permit; therefore, please contact City Hall at (920) 867-2630 before installing or erecting any pools.

House Numbers

The City of Weyauwega wants to remind all residents that to ensure public safety and well being it is essential to have house numbers visible for Police, EMS, Fire and all safety personnel. The City of Weyauwega code §419-16 requires the following: The numbers shall be conspicuously placed immediately above, on or at the side of the proper door of each building so that they can be plainly seen from the street. Whenever any building is more than 50 feet from the street line, the number of the building shall be conspicuously displayed at the street line, near the walk, driveway or common entrance to such building, and upon a gatepost, fence, tree, post or other appropriate place so as to be easily discernible from the sidewalk. The numbers shall be not less than 2½ inches in height, with dark lettering against a light background. Script numbers may not be used as the primary address numbers.

Residential Garbage Pickup/Recycling

The City of Weyauwega contracts with Graichen Sanitation of New London for residential garbage pickup and recycling.

Garbage for residents on:

- the north half of the City (north of centerline of Alfred Street) is picked up every Tuesday;
- the south half of the City (south of centerline of Alfred Street) has pickup every Thursday.

Garbage should be placed at the curb at 7:00 a.m. on the day of your scheduled pickup.



Recycling is picked up on the last Tuesday or Thursday of every month. Your recyclables should be set apart from your regular garbage. Following are some simple sorting steps for recycling:

**Do NOT use plastic bags—
use bins or garbage cans.**

All recyclable items, which includes tin cans, plastic bottles (#1 and #2), glass bottles and jars (food & beverage only), newspapers, magazines, junk mail, container board (cereal or other boxboard) can be put in the same container. No sorting is required.

- Rinse cans/bottles and discard lids.
- Remove labels from tin cans.
- No foil, motor oil bottles, scrap metal, cups, drinking glasses, ceramics, windows, vases, cookware, light bulbs, or candle jars.
- Cardboard should be cut to 3 ft x 3 ft (no pizza boxes or wax-lined boxes).

As with garbage, recyclables should be set out at the curb at 7:00 a.m. on the day of pickup. If recyclables are not prepared as per the above guidelines, they will be tagged and left at the curb.

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Number of Contaminants Required to be Tested

This table displays the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. The CCR may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown on the CCR. If testing is done less frequently, the results shown on the CCR are from the past five years.

An attendant will open the City of Weyauwega Yard Waste Site, located on Slough Road, on April 3, 2013. During April and May the site will be open every Wednesday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

During the months of June through September the site will be open every other Saturday starting on June 8th.

During the month of October the site hours on Saturdays will be extended one hour, with open hours from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The site will be open every Wednesday and Saturday of October and November.

City of Weyauwega residents may burn leaves or brush daily from 5:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m., but not on city streets or sidewalks, and only in a safe and responsible manner.

* Family pass plus one includes immediate family and one other person such as a babysitter, grandparent, etc.

One non-swimming adult/parent may enter the pool area for free to supervise a paid child. All other non-swimmers must buy a swim pass to enter the pool area. It is recommended that all children under 12 be supervised by an adult.

Pool Rules – For Your Safety

- 1) No smoking, alcohol, or pets allowed.
- 2) Floating balls and noodles are allowed in the shallow end of the pool only.
- 3) All other flotation devices are not allowed.
- 4) No running, shoving, dunking, chicken fights, foul language, etc.
- 5) Do not throw hard objects, dig holes, or climb on the lifeguard chairs.
- 6) Do not sit or hang on the ropes.
- 7) Do not move or play with the aerators.
- 8) Patrons who wish to enter the deep water (past the 4 ft. rope) may be required to demonstrate their swimming ability.
- 9) Only one person is allowed on the diving board at a time.
- 10) No swimming under the dock or jumping off the dock (the dock is for swimming lesson use only).
- 11) Only one bounce is allowed on the diving board.
- 12) Dive or jump only in a straight line from the end of the diving board to avoid hitting swimmers.
- 13) No “bombing” people off the board (those who do not follow this rule will be kicked out immediately).

Other rules may need to be enforced at the discretion of the lifeguards. There are good reasons for all of these rules. We will be happy to answer any questions concerning the rules listed above.

Did you know...?



Your water can become contaminated if connections to your plumbing system are not properly protected!

A cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water (potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution. State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable

water connection and use. Cross-connections must be properly protected or eliminated.

To avoid contamination, backflow preventers are required by state plumbing codes wherever there is an actual or potential hazard for a cross-connection. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources requires all public water suppliers to maintain an on-going Cross-Connection Control Program involving public education, onsite inspections, and possible corrective actions by building owners if required.
